Does God Only Care *for the Chosen People?*



Long ago God had set aside the Israelites as His chosen people. He gave them laws and prophets and set up a covenant with them, that they would be His people and He would be their God. He promised them

that He would send them a Savior.

When Jesus the Savior came, His first mission was to care for God's chosen people. In today's Gospel reading, however, a woman who was not an Israelite came to ask Jesus for help. At first Jesus refused- He had been sent to God's children, and "it is not right to take the food of the children and throw it to the dogs." But the woman said, "even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from the master's table." She knew that Jesus could help her. When He saw how much faith she had, He did what she asked and cured her daughter.

Jesus wasn't trying to make the woman give up. He was giving her a chance to show how much humility and faith she had. Jesus used this to show the people that God will let anyone who believes, like this woman, become part of His chosen people.

For All Mankind.

and ost of us are the foreigners, the non-Israelites, about whom today's First Reading prophesies. Coming to worship the God of Israel, we stand in the line of faith epitomized by the Canaanite woman in today's Gospel.

Calling to Jesus as Lord and Son of David, this foreigner shows her great faith in God's covenant with Israel. Jesus tests her faith O three times. He refuses to answer her cry. Then, He tells her His mission is only to Israelites. Finally, He uses "dog," an epithet used to disparage non-Israelites. Yet she persists, believing that He alone offers salvation. In this family drama, we see fulfilled Isaiah's prophecy and the promise we sing of in the Psalm: in Jesus, God makes known among all the nations His way and His salvation.

At the start of salvation history, God called Abraham. He chose his offspring, Israel, from all the nations on the face of the earth to build His covenant kingdom. In God's plan, Abraham was to be the father of many nations. Israel was to be the firstborn of a worldwide family of God, made up of all who believe what the Canaanite woman professes, that Jesus is Lord.

Jesus came first to restore the kingdom to Israel. But His ultimate mission was the reconciliation of the world, as Paul declares in the Epistle. In the Mass we join all peoples in doing Him homage. As Isaiah foretold, we come to His holy mountain, the heavenly Jerusalem, to offer sacrifice at His altar. With the Canaanite, we take our place at the Master's table to be fed as His children.

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Bernard of Clairvaux, O.Cist (1090 – 1153) French abbot and Doctor of the Church- Feast Day August 20.

After the death of his mother, Bernard joined the Cistercian Order. He also persuaded four of his five brothers and several of his friends to follow his example. Three years later, he was sent to found a new abbey at an isolated glen in France which became the famous Abbey of Clairvaux. Bernard was appointed Abbot and began an active life which has made him stand out in the history of the 12th century. He founded numerous other monasteries, wrote many books and treatises and undertook many journeys.

The reputation of Bernard spread and even the Popes were governed by his advice. In the year 1128, Bernard assisted at the Council of Troyes, at which he traced the outlines of the Rule of the Knights Templar, who soon became the ideal of Christian nobility. On the death of the Pope in 1130, a schism broke out in the Church. The king of France convened a national council of the French bishops and Bernard was chosen to judge between Innocent and Anacletus, the rival popes. Innocent was chosen by the council, but there were still large portions of the Christian world supporting Anacletus. Bernard helped to convince most of these regions to rally behind Innocent.

Having helped end the schism, Bernard was then called upon to combat heresy. In 1139, Bernard assisted at the Second Council of the Lateran, denouncing the teachings of Peter Abelard, travelling throughout southern France preaching against heresy.

Pope Eugene III commissioned Bernard to launch the Second Crusade and he travelled throughout France and Germany arousing enthusiasm for the holy war. The last years of Bernard's life were saddened by the failure of this expedition, the entire responsibility for which was thrown upon him. Bernard died at age 63, after 40 years spent in the cloister.

Bernard's theology and Mariology, how he explained the virginity of Mary, the "Star of the Sea", how the faithful should pray on the Virgin Mary, and how he relied on the Virgin Mary as Mediatrix, continue to be of major importance, particularly within the Cistercian and Trappist Orders. His influence led Pope Alexander III to launch reforms that would lead to the establishment of Canon Law. Bernard was also instrumental in re-emphasizing the importance of Lectio Divina and contemplation on Scripture within the Cistercian Order. Bernard considered Lectio Divina and contemplation guided by the Holy Spirit the keys to nourishing Christian spirituality.

Canonized in 1174, he was the first Cistercian monk to be made a saint. Pope Pius VIII bestowed on him the title of Doctor of the Church. He is fondly remembered as the "Mellifluous Doctor" (the Honey-Sweet voiced Doctor) for his eloquence.
