Hope during tribulation.

In this, the second-to-last week of the Church year, Jesus has finally made it to Jerusalem. Near to His passion and death, He gives us a teaching of hope, telling us how it will be when He returns again in glory. Today's Gospel is taken from the end of a long discourse in which Jesus describes tribulations the likes of which haven't been seen “since the beginning of God's creation”. He describes what amounts to a dissolution of God's creation, a “devolution” of the world to its original state of formlessness and void. First, human community - nations and kingdoms - will break down. Then the earth will stop yielding food and begin to shake apart. Next, the family will be torn apart from within and the last faithful individuals will be persecuted. Finally, the Temple will be desecrated and the earth emptied of God's presence. God is described putting out the lights that He established in the sky in the very beginning - the sun, the moon and the stars. Into this “uncreated” darkness, the Son of Man, in whom all things were made, will come. Jesus has already told us that the Son of Man must be humiliated and killed. In the Gospel He describes His ultimate victory, using royal-divine images drawn from the Old Testament: clouds, glory, and angels. He shows Himself to be the fulfillment of all God's promises to save “the elect,” the faithful remnant. As the First Reading tells us, this salvation will include the bodily resurrection of those who sleep in the dust. We are to watch for this day, when His enemies are finally made His footstool, as the Epistle envisions. We can wait in confidence knowing, as we pray in the Psalm, that we will one day delight at His right hand forever.

St. Elizabeth of Hungary - Feast Day November 17th	
<p>St. Elizabeth was born in 1207, the daughter of Alexander II, King of Hungary. At the age of four Elizabeth was brought to the court of the rulers of Thuringia in central Germany to become betrothed to a young Louis IV, heir to the Landgrave of Thuringia (also known as Ludwig IV), a future union which would reinforce political alliances between the families. She was raised by the Thuringian court so she would be familiar with the local language and culture. In 1221, at the age of fourteen, Elizabeth married Louis; the same year he was enthroned as Landgrave, and the marriage appears to have been happy.</p> <p>In 1223, Franciscan friars arrived, and the teenaged Elizabeth not only learned about the ideals of Francis of Assisi, but started to live them, leading an austere life, practicing penance, and devoted to works of charity. Louis was not upset by his wife's charitable efforts, believing that the distribution of his wealth to the poor would bring eternal reward; he is venerated in Thuringia as a saint, though he was never canonized by the Church.</p> <p>Elizabeth's life changed irrevocably in 1227 when Louis, en route to join the Sixth Crusade, died of a fever in Italy. After his death, Elizabeth left the court, made arrangements for the care of their three children, and in 1228 renounced the world, becoming a tertiary of St. Francis. She built the Franciscan hospital at Marburg and devoted herself to the care of the sick until her death at the age of 24 in 1231.</p> <p>In her short life, Elizabeth manifested such great love for the poor and suffering that she has become the patroness of Catholic charities and of the Secular Franciscan Order. Elizabeth understood well the lesson Jesus taught when he washed his disciples' feet at the Last Supper - the Christian must be one who serves the humblest needs of others. Of royal blood, Elizabeth could have lorded it over her subjects. Yet she served them with such a loving heart that her brief life won for her a special place in the hearts of many.</p> <p>Elizabeth is also an example to us in her following the guidance of a spiritual director. Growth in the spiritual life is a difficult process, and we often need to have someone to challenge us.</p> <p>St. Elizabeth is also the patron saint of bakers, the homeless, nursing services, widows, and young brides.
